My dissertation examines the influence of religious affiliation on the ethnic identity construction of Catholic and Protestant Mexican immigrants in Santa Ana, CA. My findings suggest that Mexican ethnic identities diverge along religious lines, even as both comparison groups assert ethnic legitimacy and maintain commonalities across religions. Based on four years of field work and fifty in-depth interviews of Mexican immigrants, my data uncover several key spheres of social boundary work. Catholicism bolsters Mexican ethnicity via its homeland orientation while Protestantism draws from diverse cultural repertoires. Contested territories related to ethnicity are revealed in the intra-ethnic policing of Mexican authenticity, beliefs about the spirit realm, social network patterns, and attitudes toward ethnic enclaves. Beyond the religious sphere, my study carries broad implications for understanding Latino experiences of assimilation, civic engagement, and racialization.

Latino Protestant Congregations Project Research Fellow (2014-2017):
